

In the 1920s, Japan's emergence as an imperial power and as major supplier of consumer goods and medical supplies came with a price—the vast cash influx created a consumer mass culture in Japan. One extreme aspect of this shift to consumption was labeled Ero-guro, meaning grotesque, erotic. Consumers and critics recognized Ero-guro as a process that short-circuited humanistic desires into embedded desires for annihilation, suicide, and death.
